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## **SPEED HUMPS**


The speeding along Landis
Lakes Drive has become a

members who are passionate

families that live along this road have been canvassing the families on Landis Lakes Drive to see if there is enough support to have Public Works put in five speed humps to try and correct this problem. The rules for Public Works' involvement states that only residents that live along the actual street where the proposed speed humps will be installed can vote. It is not a decision of an entire HOA community or HOA board members. To learn more about the details of the speed hump approval process, review the document from Public Works on our website at

The canvassing will continue over the next several weeks to the houses that are eligible to vote, and if enough support is garnered to move forward, the process will start of providing and collecting the official ballots to the voting population. If the vote passes, funding decisions will be considered. The total cost for this project

would be \$11,150. However, the cost to the neighborhood would be \$5,575, as metro government would cover half the cost. ## **NEIGHBORHOOD SAFETY**

According to civil authorities, light and sound encourage uninvited, unwanted visitors to leave your property immediately.



Here are some simple, inexpensive methods to discourage unwanted visitors.

- Ensure all doors are closed and locked 24-7 including your garage.
- Install a home-alarm system that will alert you if anyone opens a door or easy-access window.
   This can and probably should include:
  - Motion-activated lighting and cameras with immediate notifications to your phone. (These can be installed separately and alone.)
  - Outdoor speakers to address your uninvited guests from your phone and to trigger outdoor alarms manually from your phone.
- Locate air horns strategically throughout the home.
- Discuss a plan with your loved ones in case there are intruders discovered outside or inside your home.
- Invest in self-defense training.
- Meet your neighbors share your contact information. Be watchful of any vehicles on their property, especially during the day. If you're not sure your neighbors are home – call them!
- Consider a warning system with your immediate neighbors using a text or a neighbor alert App.
